Dear Friends

The email came from Lee ( at Ealing Green), telling us all that something exciting would soon be happening ... something new ... something unexpected .... when? ..... on ...25 December ... what was it again Lee?

There was I, thinking ...gosh ... this is very early ... and then ping .... A similar note came in, asking for the letter from Alan (at Kingsdown)

I wasn't sure whether I wanted to accept that I should be beginning to feel Christmassy or not .... But that word is beginning to creep into church vocabulary. In fact in the pub where I sometimes go to eat my lunch the Christmas Tree has been up since mid-November.

I am sure that most of us (if not already!) will be feeling Christmassy soon enough - Carol services, Nativity plays, Christingles, parties, and even Santa ... its definitely happening ....

We await the birth – or the memory of a birth – of a baby boy – born into the world much as it is now – full of joys, full of sorrows, full of love, full of anger and violence.

It is impossible as we approach Christmas this year not to see through the tinsel and the balloons to the real world – where certainly many are happy, and prosperous, and healthy and loved .... But also where people are homeless, landless, frightened, oppressed and poor. If we notice nothing else from parliament's debates about Brexit and Syria and Yemen and Saudi Arabia, we notice how difficult the decisions are... how hard, it is to know the way forward.... How much the entire world needs prayer ... needs the wisdom of God.

This was the world Jesus was born into ... the reality of a mixed world .... Where reflection focuses as much on what is wrong as what is right.... As much on memories of "Christmases past" as on the joys of the present ... and the blessings of being with those we are with.

Its ok – amongst the tinsel – to be real ... to think of your life, the world, the church as it is and to bring it, and your part in it to God in prayer.

If we do, try to "be real" this Christmas time ... we might even be surprised ....

This was what brought Christmas alive for me last year ... very simple ... very ordinary ... very special ...

It was a nice evening, and I fancied walking to the Circuit Meeting that was to be held at Trinity Church in Harrow. I set off ready to arrive about 15 minutes early so that I could get a coffee before the meeting. The route was unfamiliar to me. I had not walked it before. I therefore followed the GPS on my phone. It worked well. I almost arrived ... but almost isn't good enough! I was five minutes away with 20 minutes to spare. BUT the GPS led me to the middle of nowhere ... no church ... no people ... just houses.

I walked up and down for a bit. I knew I was nearby ... but simply could not find the church. I asked someone and they had no idea where it was. A few minutes later a young woman passed me with her headphones in her ear. Realising that I wanted to ask her something, she took them out of her ears, and I explained that my eye sight was poor and I could not find the church. She replied in the rather broken English of one fairly new to our nation that she had never heard of it, so I told her not to worry and continued my street search... annoyed by now (with myself) since it was nearly 8 O'clock and I hate being late!"

I wandered around for about another 15 minutes, and then turned as I heard someone running and calling out "Excuse me, excuse me ... I have found your church". It was the young woman ... she had evidently seen the church on her way home ... and had come back to find me to tell me where it was. In the event, she not only told me where it was (we were a good five minutes from it) but walked me there, and then told me to have a good evening!

This woman ... for no reason ... no gain on her part ... gave me half an hour of her time and took me to exactly where I needed to go. Would I have done that for someone else? Would you? People say that our streets are not friendly ... on this evening, in this place, for me how wrong they were.

**This** is Christmas. I have thought much about this woman and what she did. Look for these kind of moments this Christmas, and maybe ... make a few yourself too.

Jesus isn't tinsel flapping in the wind, but he is the light that brings hope and joy and humanity and love into every time and every place in every situation.

If you want to "Be Real" this Christmas, you will find God at work ... being "real" with you!

Have a lovely Christmas though .... And enjoy every minute of it!

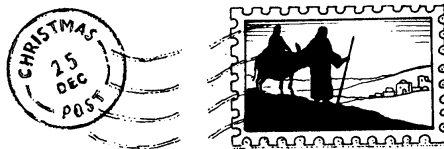

taking part in the traditional ceremony itself. It really was a lovely morning and you can find a short video on our Facebook and YouTube pages (search 10th Ealing BB).

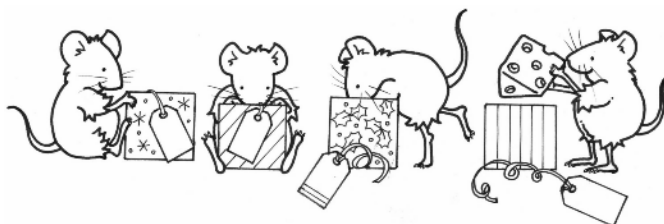
The always-popular West London 5-a-side Football Competition took place in Hayes on Saturday

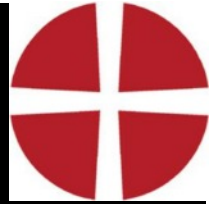
The uplifting comments and kind words given by members of the church family are always lovely to hear -- David, Mark and I are so very grateful for your prayers and support.

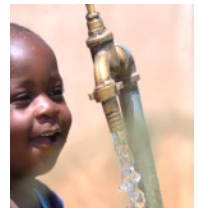

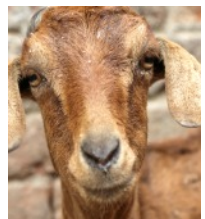

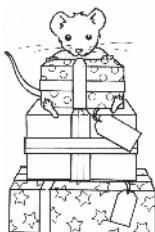

Love doesn't envy another's home that has coordinated Christmas china and table linens.

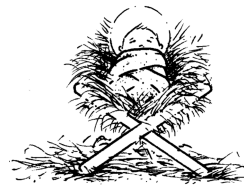
Love doesn't yell at the kids to get out of the way, but is thankful they are there to be in the way.

but the plural of house is houses not hicc.

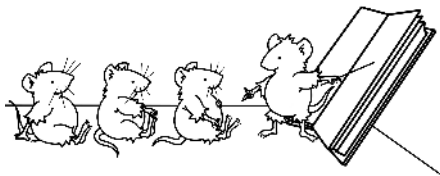
If the plural of man will always be men,

# Christmas and St Luke's Gospel



It is to St Luke's wonderful gospel that many Christians turn as the year draws to a close and Christmas approaches, for it is to St Luke that we owe the fullest account of the nativity.

Luke alone tells us the story of Mary and the angel's visit to her, and has thus given the Church the wonderful Magnificat of Mary.

Luke alone tells us the story of Simeon's hymn of praise, thus giving us the wonderful Nunc Dimmittis. Imagine an Anglican evensong without the Nunc Dimmittis.

Luke alone tells us the story of how the angels appeared to the shepherds and how the shepherds then visited the infant Jesus. So – imagine Christmas cards and nativity scenes every year without the shepherds arriving to visit baby Jesus. Imagine school nativity plays without our children dressed as shepherds or sheep. So – thank you, Luke!

What makes it so amazing is that Luke was not a Jew! The man who wrote the fullest nativity story, and indeed more of the New Testament than any other single person, was a Gentile!

## *So, who saved Christmas?*

After the Civil War, when Oliver Cromwell and his Puritans abolished Christmas celebrations (amongst other things), Christmas was just another working day and nobody wished each other 'Happy Christmas' because it wasn't!

Even the restoration of the Monarchy didn't help matters and by the early 19th century, the burgeoning industrial revolution was taking over. A lot of villagers had moved to the towns and cities. Industrial output was the prime consideration and it seemed that the rural Twelve Days of Christmas celebrations would soon be confined to history.

Then, in 1843, 'A Christmas Carol' by Charles Dickens was published and, although he was hoping that Christmas might return to the more joyful times that his forebears had known, what he really wanted was to turn a profit from his book. So, to publicise the book, he gave readings of his tale, sometimes for charity but usually for a fee for himself. But so many people were touched by the story and by his 'gift of the gab', that some of the factory owners decided that perhaps they should shut their premises on Christmas Day and give their workers the day off to be with family and friends!



As a child, Dickens' life had been bleak. He'd worked in Warren's boot-blacking factory and his own parents were never as family-minded as the Crachits. Ironically, through this best-seller and his subsequent writings, he became as rich as his hero, Ebenezer Scrooge. All the money he made turned him into a passionate champion of the poor, campaigning for changes to the child labour laws and improvements to the conditions in the workhouses.

'A Christmas Carol' really caught on, as did the Christmas celebrations that he had written about. No longer did people work on the day itself but the return to a twelve-day party was not to be achieved until our own recent times.

But people could, and did, spend Christmas Eve and Christmas Day with their families, and they could also find time to spread a little goodwill among the poorer people of the towns.

So, who saved Christmas? Why, Ebenezer Scrooge of course!

# CAP is worth millions to UK economy



Recent research by the London School of Economics has found the debt charity, Christians Against Poverty (CAP) contributes £32 million to the UK economy. It seems that for every pound the Christian debt charity spent, it benefitted the wider society four times as much.

The LSE also said CAP provides 'crucial' face-to-face support and goes far beyond simple debt advice.

Christians Against Poverty was founded by John Kirkby in Bradford in 1996. He believed God was calling him to sacrifice his career in finance and use his knowledge of the industry to help the poor. Over the past 22 years, CAP has negotiated with creditors, set up budgeting systems and offered a lifeline to those trapped in debt.

Nowadays, CAP runs 645 various projects with churches across the UK, including job clubs and debt advice.
