CHRISTIAN AID NEWS SEASON FOR CHANGE



Last year at Harvest Time, Christian Aid featured the EU-funded Breaking the Barriers programme which aims to strengthen the social status of women in rural Ethiopia, Malawi, Burkina Faso and Honduras, and this appeal raised over £1 million. Thanks to the support of their partner the Women Support Association there are now over 100 women-led Support Associations in South Omo, Ethiopia. Women reported that men are now working alongside them in the fields during harvest and more girls are attending school. The Breaking the Barriers programme has now won a Climate Coalition Green Heart Hero Award folr overseas inspiration.

Just a little of something that has happened since last year. But what about 2019?

Hopefully, you will see a photo, in the Church Foyer, of Kasthuri and her son Mathi. Kasthuri was born into India's Darlit community: she's faced prejudice all her life - no rights, no security, no voice. When she was ostracised by her family for marrying against their will, and later abandoned by her husband, she was excluded even from her own community. She survived because someone had faith in her. Selvi is from a different caste, but she broke her society's biggest barrier to give Kasthuri what she needed most: a home to raise her son Mathi. Selvi explains: "I want to break any form of slavery and exploitation of women, whether it is due to caste, class or gender."

Selvi also bought the land for the women's farming collective. The farm works because of EcoVeg. This project trains people from excluded communities in natural farming, and provides the marketing and logistics to start a business.

—-Land that was abandoned is rich again. Kasthuri can feel pride, security and belonging. And Mathi has the chance of a better future. Kasthuri says "I have no words to explain how happy I am to be here with my son."

Maybe we can help more women to build sustainable futures for themselves and their children?

Let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, wherever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all. GALATIANS 6: 9-10.

As usual, there will no doubt be some attempts to give the donated goods some sort of decorative Harvest Festival setting and anyone free to lend their talents to this task, on Saturday, 5 October, at 10.30 am, will be most welcome.

Festival of Tabernacles

On 13-20th October this year many people around the world will be celebrating the Jewish festival of Tabernacles, or . They will celebrate the Harvest, and also remember God bringing the Israelites out of Egypt and through 40 years in the desert.

The biblical book of Deuteronomy contains a description of what Tabernacles should have been like back then. "Celebrate... for seven days. Be joyful... you, your sons and daughters, your male and female servants, and the Levites, the foreigners, the fatherless and the widows who live in your towns."

These festivals were not just a celebration, but also an expression of gratitude to God: "celebrate the festival to the Lord your God...For the Lord your God will bless you in all your harvest and in all the work of your hands, and your joy will be complete." Tabernacles was a proper holiday, with two whole days off normal work and seven days of feasting.

Farming looks very different today. Very few of us have had to sweat long hours over crops, so we're not as ready for (or deserving of) a rest and a party as our ancestors were at this time of year. That might be even more the case in future, as the agritech revolution unfolds. For example, small autonomous tractors are already becoming available that do less damage to the soil and make better use of steep or oddly shaped fields.

Many arable farms already hire contractors to do the routine work with large specialist GPS-equipped machinery. In future years those people might find themselves using very different kinds of high-tech kit, acting more as land-management advisors, helping farmers to gather data and to find ways of improving soil quality, biodiversity and the water cycle.

I'm very grateful for the food that arrives on my shelves. Instead of worrying about whether or not we earned it. our modern-day Tabernacles or Harvest celebration could include ways of encouraging those involved in agriculture and developing new aaricultural technologies, as well as enjoying how we can learn about and benefit from God's creation through Science.

So, after you celebrate Harvest at church, why not follow it up with a trip to a local farm this month? Why not learn from the ancient Israelites, and follow it up with a meal together? It stands to reason that those of us who live in countries where food is plentiful and cheap could do with being proportionately more generous in our gratitude and giving. Should we throw better parties? Probably!



Bahamas Hurricane Appeal

All We Can's CEO Graeme Hodge would like to thank all those who are supporting All We Can' Bahamas Hurricane Appeal. Only two weeks after Hurricane Dorian devastated areas of the Bahamas the islands faced further damage from heavy rains brought by tropical storm Humberto. Although Humberto wasn't expected to make landfall it brought dangerous salt, surf and rip tides to the north-western Bahamas The heavy rains and strong winders will also impact ongoing rescue and recovery efforts following Hurricane Dorian.

As the full extent of the devastation inflicted by Hurricane Dorian becomes clear, All We Can and the Methodist Church in Britain will continue to support communities in their efforts to provide emergency response and look towards rebuilding.

The BBC warned of 'unimaginable' human suffering and a 'staggering death toll in the wake of Hurricane Dorian, All We Can and the Methodist Church in Britain launched a joint appeal for those affected in The Bahamas

Our long-term partner in the region is responding with food, clean water and medicines. However, they have issued an appeal for more support as the full extent of the devastation is uncovered. The response is focusing on the Abaco and Great Bahamas islands which were hit the hardest by the hurricane. All We Can and the Methodist Church in Britain are calling for support for this urgent appeal. All We Can's CEO, Graeme Hodge said "Together, we stand shoulder to shoulder with people affected by Hurricane Dorian – with communities, families, children and grandparents at the very heart of the suffering."

The Methodist Church in Britain's Director of Global Relationships, the Revd Conrad Hicks said, "With limited resources, our sisters and brothers across the Caribbean are responding to the plight of those impacted by this natural disaster. Tyndale - Bible Translation

This month is the 501th anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation, and so a good time to pay tribute to an outstanding English scholar, translator and martyr of the Reformation.

William Tyndale (c. 1494 – 6th October 1536) was born near Gloucester, and studied at Oxford and Cambridge. He could speak seven languages, and was proficient in ancient Hebrew and Greek. As a priest, his abilities would have taken him a long way, but by 1523 Tyndale's only desire was to translate the Bible, so that English men and women could read it for themselves. It became his life's passion.

For Tyndale had rediscovered a vital doctrine that the Church had been ignoring: that of justification by faith. He had found it when reading Erasmus's Greek edition of the New Testament. In fact, his life's work was well summed up in some words of his mentor, Erasmus: "Christ desires His mysteries to be published abroad as widely as possible. I would that [the Gospels and the epistles of Paul] were translated into all languages, of all Christian people, and that they might be read and known."

Tyndale's translation was the first Bible to be published in English, the first to draw directly from Hebrew and Greek texts, and the first English translation to take advantage of the printing press.

It was to cost him his life. For Tyndale's work was seen as a direct challenge to the power of both the Roman Catholic Church and the laws of England in maintaining the Church's position.

When the authorities had tried to stop his translation, Tyndale fled to Hamburg, Wittenberg, Cologne, and finally to the Lutheran city of Worms. It was there, in 1525, his New Testament emerged. It was quickly smuggled into England, and King Henry VIII, Cardinal Wolsey, and others, were furious.

Tyndale moved on to Antwerp, where for nine more years he continued his work. Then in May 1535 he was betrayed, arrested, and jailed in a castle near Brussels. Tied to the stake for strangulation and burning, his dying prayer was that the King of England's eyes would be opened. Sure enough, two years later King Henry authorised the Great Bible for the Church of England, which relied largely on Tyndale's work.

Not only that, but in 1611, the 54 scholars who produced the King James Bible drew very heavily from Tyndale. Even today we honour him: in 2002, Tyndale was placed at number 26 in the BBC's poll of 100 Greatest Britons.

Take the sun's rising; having extinguished the stars, ever so slowly and gently, it eases itself over the rim of the world. THE IMPORTANCE OF REPORTING CRIME INCIDENTS

What makes the police be quicker in dealing with crime incidents is when these incidents have been reported and immediately via the proper police reporting channels (101, 999, Met Police website, and @MetCC). All these services have 24/7 paid staff waiting to take your reports and then dispatch them to be dealt with.

Once this is done, please let us know via OWL and include the crime reference no. We remain most grateful to everyone who has turned a difficult personal experience into an opportunity to help prevent crime whether this has been shared directly or it has been passed onto us via Social Media.

However, there have been several cases across the Borough whereby crimes have been posted on Facebook or Nextdoor but the Police have not been contacted. Failure to report a crime results in a reduction in recorded crime, which leads to fewer officers and hence a further rise in crime. It may appear that posting on social media is quicker than calling or logging an incident online on the Met's site but to be clear the Police cannot react to reports posted on Facebook, Nextdoor, or shared privately via Whatsapp.

Depending on the severity of the case, there were many occasions and on a daily basis when the police arrived within 2 minutes of the 999 call. From a personal experience, the last one was this past Sunday. Everyone, we are counting on you to please report all incidents and suspicious activities to the police first.

TEXT MESSAGE SCAMS



A text might not be from who you think – Smishing is when criminals pretend a message is from your bank or another organisation you trust. They will usually tell you there has been fraud on your account and will ask you to deal with it by calling a number or visiting a fake website to update your personal details. Please take a moment to stop and think and realise this is the fraud...

These signs indicate a text message might not be genuine:

• It asks you to provide sensitive personal or financial information, passwords, or to make transactions by following a link in the message.

• It asks you to call a certain number but that number is unknown to you. In this case, call your bank on a number that you trust to check the number and message is authentic. E.g. – such as the number on the back of your card.

• The sender uses an urgent tone, urging you to 'act now'.

Christians Face Harassment and Persecution

Christians face harassment in 143 countries with a record increase in restrictions on religion imposed by many governments. It also finds violence and harassment against religious groups are on the rise.

'The excellent new review of Christian persecution by the Bishop of Truro for the Foreign & Commonwealth Office (FCO) found that Christians were the most persecuted religious group in the world today. In contrast, the Pew Report states: 'Religious restrictions have been rising around the world for the past decade.' 52 governments, including China, Indonesia and Russia, are now imposing high or very high levels of restrictions on religion.

CHINA The Pew Report notes that by 2017 the Chinese government had 'ramped up' efforts to arrest and deport Christian missionaries. China is restricting the number of religious groups who can register with the government. Even registered Chinese Christian churches are being shut down.

ISLAM The Pew Report states that since 2015, Islam has been the most common state religion around the world. In the Middle East and North Africa, most governments favour Islam over other faiths.

Growing numbers of countries are restricting religion. 'The number of countries [in the region] where people experience the highest level of hostility towards religion has risen by almost 50 per cent.'

The survey of 198 countries finds religious restrictions and violence are

spreading to Europe. In the UK in 2016, a Sunni Muslim man killed an Ahmadi Muslim shopkeeper because he had 'disrespected the Prophet Mohammed'.

Religious terrorism is growing in Europe, the Middle East and North Africa.. According to the Report: 'The Middle East and North Africa has seen the highest levels of religious violence by organised groups.'

That violence has spread from just four countries in 2007 to 11 of the 20 countries in the region by the end of 2017. Organised groups spreading religious violence include Isis, Al Qaeda, the Taliban and Hamas.

Among the most populous countries in the world, Egypt, India, Russia, Pakistan and Indonesia have the highest restrictions on religion, according to the report.

Another region to experience 'a sharp rise in government laws and policies restricting religious freedom' is Sub-Saharan Africa.

The report singles out Nigeria as a country with one of the largest increases in religious violence by organised groups since 2007.

Turkmenistan continues to deny visas to foreigners suspected of missionary work and with Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan has imposed restrictions on Christian literature.

In the Asia-Pacific region 86 per cent of countries' governments were found to be intimidating religious groups.
