Climate Change



Around the world, vulnerable communities are experiencing the effects of climate change.

ALL WE CAN

Gradually shifting weather patterns, rising sea levels and more extreme weather events are all clear and devastating evidence of a rapidly changing climate. Often, the world's poorest communities are those impacted most by a changing and increasingly unpredictable climate.

Belyu's story

In her 45 years, Belyu has seen dramatic change in the small village of Cherkos in Ethiopia, where she lives. In her youth, Belyu remembers two rainy seasons — one from February to June, known locally as the belg season, and a second in the latter half of the year, known as meher.

Today, the change in climate means that the short, sharp rains of the belg season no longer make an appearance in the central Ethiopian Highlands where Cherkos is situated. Only the meher season remains – but this season is longer, and the rains are too heavy for the soil in Cherkos to absorb. When the meher season arrives, the ground is quickly oversaturated and crops struggle to grow well. In a community where life is defined by the rhythms of the land, this change presents a deadly challenge.

"When I was in childhood, there was a surplus of crops," she said. "But now, I live in poverty." Like many others in Cherkos, Belyu remembers a time when providing for the family was not the struggle that it is today. Nowadays, she estimates that families like hers are only able to produce a third of what they could just thirty years ago.

The impact of this dramatic decrease in production means that there is a 'food gap' – a few months in every year where Belyu struggles to produce enough to feed herself and the four children she looks after. Where just one generation ago there was enough for all, now there is real scarcity.

For to us a child is born

For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' (Isaiah 9:6)

Approaching Christmas, we are very aware of the political and economic uncertainties that face us.



The prophet Isaiah also lived in such uncertain times, as the Assyrians had just conquered the northern kingdom of Israel (734-732 BC). This fulfilled Isaiah's warnings to the people, who had turned their back on God and His ways. However, Isaiah is able to bring a word of hope, promising a Messiah who would come like a great light: 'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light' (Isaiah 9:2). These words are fulfilled in the birth of Jesus 700 years later and describe the person of Jesus:

Wonderful Counsellor: He will give us the wisdom we need, especially when we have difficult decisions to make at work or home, or in dealing with our finances or future direction.

Mighty God: He will provide the help and strength to face a difficult diagnosis, family crisis or relationships breakdown, as we trust His plan and purpose for our lives.

Everlasting Father: He cares for us as a father cares for His children, so that we can come to Him when we feel alone or we are really struggling, knowing that He hears and will answer our prayers.

Prince of Peace: He has secured peace by His cross and resurrection, and so we can find in Him true acceptance, forgiveness and peace for our lives, relationships and future.

Christmas is the time to celebrate a God who is faithful to all His promises, 'the zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this' (7)

'It's gonna be a lonely Christmas'.

The pressure to have fun with friends and family is real over the Christmas period. In fact, over nine million people in the UK say they're always or often lonely. (Red Cross).

When Mary became pregnant with Jesus, she probably felt very alone. Her situation would be seen as scandalous, as few believed that she was pregnant by the Holy Spirit! Yet, God was with her: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call His name Immanuel" (which means, 'God with us'). (Matthew 1:23).

The true meaning of Christmas is that Jesus Christ came down from heaven to be with us. The separation we may feel from others is nothing compared to the distance that God has already gone for us.

Here are 5 tips for helping those who are lonely:

Take time to talk

Take time to talk to an older person this Christmas, at the supermarket, pub or on a walk. Just saying hello can make a big difference to someone who's lonely.

Give someone a call

Take the time to speak to friends and family that you won't be with this Christmas. A short phone call can have a big impact.

Give a neighbour a card

Ring the doorbell and give your neighbour a Christmas card. Start a conversation and make a connection.

Having a party?

Hosting a Christmas party or meal? If you know somebody who might be alone, invite them to join you!

Pray for Others

If you hear of someone who's on their own, pray for them. Pray that God would show you how to respond!

The UK's favourite hymns



By 1908 the charity had grown to become the National Children's Home and Orphanage (NCH). Today, NCH is known as Action for Children, and this July they marked 150 years of helping vulnerable children and young people. To commemorate the occasion, the charity launched a nationwide search for the descendants of some of the UK's first children in care. Action for Children released historic images from their archives, inviting members of the public to see if they could help to identify family members.

In its 150th year, the charity is launching a campaign asking the public to 'Choose Childhood' and help urge the Government to commit to an action plan to give every child a safe and happy childhood.

Top tips for shopping safely online





It's worth thinking twice about online offers from unknown brands selling luxury items at bargain prices. Avoid clicking on sales links in emails as these can lead to fake websites that look like the real thing – type the website name directly into the address bar instead, and search for reviews before purchasing. Remember, if it seems too good to be true, it probably is.



Tip #2
Use a secure payment method

Never use a bank transfer to pay someone you don't know, even if you are buying something through a social media site. Bank transfers make it much harder to get your money back if things go wrong. To make sure you stay safe, don't transfer money to sellers, only pay by debit or credit card



Tip #3 Look for the padlock symbol

The padlock symbol in the address bar means that your connection is secure, but be aware – it does not necessarily mean the website is genuine. Try to avoid online shopping on public Wi-Fi hotspots too, as fraudsters are sometimes able to hack the network and steal any personal information you share.



Fresh Milk - Fresher longer

If you need to keep milk in the fridge for a longer time then usual buy some Semi-skimmed FILTERED Milk - its more expensive BUT it has a shelf storage life of at least 7-10 days more than ordinary semi-skimmed milk. The average bottle of 2% filtered milk contains about 50% more protein, 50% less sugar, and 30% more calcium than regular 2% milk. This means that you are getting more of the nutrients that make milk awesome, while getting less of the things that makes milk less than the optimal food

It was:

300 years ago, on 31st Dec 1719 that John Flamsteed, British astronomer died. He was the first Astronomer Royal, and founder of the Greenwich Observatory.

150 years ago, on 31st Dec 1869 that Henri Matisse, the French artist, was born. He became leader of the Fauvist movement.

125 years ago, on 3rd Dec 1894 that Robert Louis Stevenson died. This Scottish novelist, short story writer, poet, essayist and travel writer was best known for his novels Treasure Island, Kidnapped and the Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde.

Also 125 years ago, on 29th Dec 1894 that Christina Rossetti, British poet and hymn-writer, died.

100 years ago, on 1st Dec 1919 that Lady Nancy Astor became the first female Member of Parliament (MP) to take her seat in the House of Commons.

90 years ago, on 12th Dec 1929 that John Osborne, British playwright, screenwriter and producer, was born. He was the first of the Angry Young Men, and best known for his play Look Back in Anger (died 1994).

80 years ago, on 1st Dec 1939 that Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer made his first ever appearance, in a children's colouring book given away by Montgomery Ward stores in the USA.

75 years ago, on 16th Dec 1944 to 16th Jan 1945 that World War II's Battle of the Bulge took place in Belgium. It was the last major German counter-offensive of the war, and an Allied victory.

70 years ago, on 1st Dec 1949 that Pablo Escobar, Colombian drug lord, was born. Head of the Medellin cartel, and considered the world's most powerful drug trafficker of the 1980s and early 1990s. (Shot dead by police in 1993, though some say it was suicide.)

60 years ago, on 1st Dec 1959 that 12 countries including the UK and USA, signed the Antarctic Treaty, setting aside Antarctica as a scientific preserve free from military activity.

50 years ago, on 18th Dec 1969 that the British Government abolished the death penalty for murder.

40 years ago, on 20th Dec 1979 that the British Government announced that council tenants would be given the right to buy their homes under a new Housing Act (effective from October 1980)

30 years ago, on 3rd Dec 1989 that US President George H W Bush and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev announced the end of the Cold War at a meeting in Malta.

Also 30 years ago, on 22nd December 1989 that the Brandenburg Gate in Berlin was reopened, effectively reuniting East and West Germany.

20 years ago, on 1st Dec 1999 that an international team of scientists announced that they had mapped an entire human chromosome. (All human chromosomes were mapped by April 2003.)

Also 20 years ago, on 2nd Dec 1999 that the UK devolved political power in Northern Ireland to the Northern Ireland Assembly and Executive Committee.

Also 20 years ago, on 31 Dec 1999 that the London Eye, at that time the world's tallest Ferris wheel – was officially opened on the banks of the River Thames. Because of mechanical problems, it didn't open to passengers until 9th March 2000.

15 years ago, on 26th Dec 2004 that the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami (also known as the Boxing Day Tsunami) took place. A massive undersea earthquake near Sumatra caused a devastating tsunami that swamped coastal areas in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand and Africa. It was one of the deadliest natural disasters in recorded history, killing over 230,000 people in 14 countries.

10 years ago, on 1st Dec 2009 that the Treaty of Lisbon came into effect. It amended the Maastricht Treaty and the Treaty of Rome, which form the constitutional basis of the European Union.
